These accomplishments include: cohort 1 counties serving well over 100 families; partnering with I.H.S. to create a stellar training program; bringing on 17 new counties to implement the program; partnering with Children and Family Futures to align Ohio START with the national START model; and partnering with our evaluation team to ensure Ohio START is achieving our anticipated outcomes.

In 2019, we look forward to continuing to bring Ohio START to more Ohio families, building a core team of START professionals at the county and state level and working as a team to build Ohio START as a national model for working with child welfare involved families with substance use disorders. #### FRANKLIN COUNTY

Franklin County START team has been officially assigned two cases. The START team is also looking to develop a partnership with an agency for child trauma assessments and treatment as there could be barriers down the road in quickly linking children with this service.

### **CARROLL COUNTY**

Carroll County has been planning implementation for Ohio START almost since the expansion was announced. They have identified their behavioral health partner; the FPM has been hired and the START caseworker is ready to begin.

#### **MEIGS COUNTY**

Two new families were enrolled this month bringing the total to seven families. Almost half of the adults in treatment are doing MAT services. The FPM was able to provide immediate recovery support to a father after going though severe mental stress caused by a parent-teacher conference.

### Topical calls with CFF

2019

Beginning in January, Children and Family Futures (CFF) will hold hour long topical calls each month for Ohio START PCSAs and their partners. These calls are scheduled for the 3<sup>rd</sup> Thursday of each month from 9:00am-10:00am. Call-in information will be provided prior to the call. During these calls, CFF will discuss a relevant and important topic surrounding START.

The first call will be held on January 17<sup>th</sup>. CFF will be discussing the integration of START with Family Drug Treatment Courts.
